GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

READ ALL RULES BEFORE FILLING OUT ENTRY BLANKS

ENTRIES WILL CLOSE ON AUGUST 5, 2023 AT 4:00 P.M. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE PAID BY AUGUST 5, 2023 AT 4:00 P.M.

The Fair office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. The office will be open for final entries on Saturday, August 5, 2023 from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. **Do not bring exhibit at the time of registration. Check with department Superintendents for specific questions and information regarding your entries.**

- 1. All entrants, including 4-H participants, must purchase a \$10.00 exhibitors pass. (Entrants age 8 and under do not need to purchase a pass). Limit two (2) exhibitor passes per entrant.
- 2. All entries will close August 5, 2023. Entries by mail, must be postmarked August 5, 2023, or before. **Entry fees must be paid by August 5, 2023. NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE!** No changes in entries will be made after 4:00 p.m. August 5, 2023.
- 3. All animals must be on the fairgrounds by 8:00 a.m., August 16, 2023, **NO EXCEPTIONS!**
- 4. Animals must not leave the grounds before 5:00 p.m., August 20, 2023. Animals and belongings must be removed from the grounds by August 21, 2023.
- 5. Animals owned by members of one family, residing on the same farm, may be combined to make an entry in the group classes.
- 6. All livestock exhibitors are expected to keep a clean, clear walkway and appearance in their respective areas, removing manure and other waste materials into designated waste containers. All livestock entrants must clear pens and stalls of all waste materials prior to leaving the grounds at the conclusion of the fair. Premium awards will not be given unless pens and stalls are cleared.
- 7. In the absence of governing rule, the opinion of the department superintendent will govern.
- 8. The Winnebago County Fair Association reserves the right to reject any exhibit or reduce the number of pens/stalls in the event that no space is available.
- 9. Evidence of ownership by exhibitors, satisfactory to judges must be made available when necessary.
- 10. No exhibits will be permitted to be removed from the grounds unless the department superintendent grants permission or approval is obtained from the fair office.
- 11. No premiums will be awarded unless the exhibit remains for the duration of the fair and pens and stalls are cleared.
- 12. No premiums will be awarded unless entries are paid in full by August 5, 2023. There will be a \$30.00 fee for returned checks.
- 13. Premium checks not cashed within 60 days of issue date will not be reissued. **The Winnebago County Fair Association, Inc. is not responsible for lost or stolen checks.** Questions or inquiries on premiums will not be considered after November 1, 2023.
- 14. Premiums will be pro-rated if, because of weather or other causes, receipts are insufficient to pay necessary expenses.
- 15. No animal exhibitor may receive more than two (2) monies in one class unless otherwise stated.
- 16. All premium checks will be distributed by superintendents at 4:00 p.m. on August 20, 2023.
- 17. Every effort will be made to safeguard all exhibitors and their exhibits, however, the Winnebago County Fair

Association will not be held liable in the event of loss or destruction of any entry from any cause.

- 18. The Winnebago County Fair Association reserves the right to make final decisions in any and all arbitration's.
- 19. Inquiries regarding the afore mentioned rules and regulations can be made at the fair office during office hours.
- 20. **NO PETS** are allowed on the grounds at any time. This includes the livestock barns. Any party found in violation of this rule is subject to forfeiture of entry fees, premium monies and expulsion from the fairgrounds.
- 21. Exhibitor passes, gate passes and other information for livestock entries may be picked up at the fair office between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 15, 2023.
- 22. All items to be exhibited in Departments J, K, L, M, O, V1-V3 & P1-P6 must be brought to departments located in Building 5 (Aqua) between 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Monday, August 14, 2023. NO ITEMS will be accepted on Tuesday, August 15, 2023. Exhibitor passes and entry tags may be picked up at the table in the front of the building during the above listed times. Doors will close at 6:00 p.m. sharp.
- 23. All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Permits are available 24-hours a day, seven days a week, by calling (217) 782-4944.
- 24. Shows are open to participants of all Illinois counties.
- 25. The Winnebago County Fair Association would like to encourage all owners of animals to register the premises where the animal is kept with the Department of Agriculture. This can be done by: a) calling the Department at 1-866-299-9256; b) registering on the internet at www.agr.state.il.us/premiseid; or c) by requesting forms from the Department by writing to Department at Bureau of Animal Health, P.O. Box 19281, Springfield, IL 62794-9281 and returning the completed forms to the Department.






CAMPING FEES



2023 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements

County Fairs

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.

All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 2. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. If an official electronic CVI is utilized, the exhibitor should be able to log on and show Bureau of Animal Health Personnel the completed CVI.
 - CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
- 3. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.
- 4. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
- 5. CVI for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 6. CVI for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 7. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise.
 - Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
 - Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- 8. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. Examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.
 - The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
- 9. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.

Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.

10. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

CATTLE

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, approved official ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable), or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

Illinois Cattle

Brucellosis

Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age, and Illinois steers are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx

Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
 - C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
 - D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
- 2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
 - A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
 - C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

SWINE

Illinois Swine

Identification

- 1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for all barrows, crossbred gilts and breeding swine.

(Note: Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for interstate movement or official testing.)

Brucellosis

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Pseudorabies

Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Out-of-State Swine

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx

Identification

- 1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification **is not** acceptable for crossbred animals..

Brucellosis

- 1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
- 2. S wine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

Pseudorabies

- 1. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
- 2. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
- 3. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- 4. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine..

SHEEP

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Market Lambs

All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Illinois Sheep

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Sheep

All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

GOATS

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapic Record Database.

Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

Illinois Goats

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Goats

All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

Illinois Equine

- 1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
- 4. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

Out-of-State Equine

All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 1. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.

POULTRY

- 1. All entries (except waterfowl, i.e. domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock OR have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to name and address of owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing and the number, breed, and species of those tested.
- Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
- 3. Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to the show.
- 4. Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by the official county fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.
- 5. All out-of-state turkeys must originate from flocks that are officially classified as U.S. Mycoplasma Gallisepticum Clean in accordance with the provisions of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or be negative to a test for Mycoplasma gallisepticum within 30 days prior to entry.
- 6. A permit is also required for out-of-state poultry. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

Please note: These poultry exhibition requirements do not apply to 4-H and FFA 1-day poultry shows where the entries are taken to the show and returned home the same day. However, a permit is required for out-of-state poultry.

CERVIDAE

(Deer, Elk, Reindeer, Caribou, Moose, Red Deer and other Related Species)

Identification

All animals shall be individually identified with an approved tag, microchip or tattoo. Elk are required to have two official/approved unique identifiers.

Illinois Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

For cervidae changing ownership or moving within the State, the owner must obtain a permit issued by the Department prior to movement and the cervid must originate from a herd that is enrolled in the Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Program or the Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Program. The permit shall be obtained no more than 72 hours in advance of the movement of the cervids by providing the following information:

- A) Name and complete mailing address of person exhibiting the cervids;
- B) Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease or Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Herd number;
- C) Name and complete mailing address of location where the animals will be exhibited;
- D) Number of animals and unique identification of the animals.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cervidae.

Out-of-State Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

- 1. All cervidae entering Illinois must be in compliance with the Illinois Wildlife Code [520 ILCS 5]. For more information, contact the Illinois Department of Natural Resources at 217/782-6384.
- 2. All cervidae entering Illinois must be accompanied by a permit from the Department and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that:
 - a. has been issued by an accredited veterinarian of the state of origin or a veterinarian in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture;
 - b. is approved by the Animal Health Official of the state of origin;
 - shows that the cervidae are free from visible evidence of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease or
 exposure thereto, do not originate from a CWD endemic area (any county and surrounding counties where CWD
 has been diagnosed in the past five years);
 - d. shows that the cervidae are not originating from a herd under quarantine for any contagious, infectious or communicable disease;
 - e. shows that the animals originate from a herd that has been monitored for at least 5 years under a state-approved CWD certification program.
- 3. A permit number can be obtained by applying online at https://www2.illinois.gov/sites/agr/Animals/AnimalHealth/Documents/permitrequestform.pdf. Applicant for permit shall furnish the following information to the Department:
 - a. Name and post office mailing address of Illinois destination;
 - b. Name and post office mailing address of the consignor and/or source herds;
 - c. Name and post office mailing address of the herd veterinarian;
 - d. Number and unique identification of cervidae in shipment..

Brucellosis

Cervidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative brucellosis card or PCFIA test within sixty (60) days prior to entry.

2023 Exhibition Livestock Health Requirements

Tuberculosis

1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States

All cervidae twelve (12) months of age and over shall be negative to two (2) single cervical test for bovine TB no less than ninety (90) days apart with the second test conducted within ninety (90) days prior to entry. These animals shall be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period unless they originate from an accredited, qualified or monitored herd.

- A. Cervidae from an accredited herd may be moved into Illinois without further TB testing provided that a certificate stating that such cervids originated from an accredited herd accompanies them.
- B. Cervidae originating from qualified or monitored herds may enter with a negative test within ninety (90) days prior to entry and a certificate stating that the animals originate from a monitored herd.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. All cervidae shall originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to two (2) additional tuberculin tests conducted within 180 and 30 days prior to entry or exhibition..

RATITES

(Ostriches, Emus, Rheas, Cassowaries and Kiwis)

Illinois Ratites

There are no requirements governing the movement of ratites within Illinois.

Out-of-State Ratites

- 1. Must be accompanied by a CVI and permit number. Entry permits are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx
- 2. Individually identified by leg band or microchip.
- 3. Negative test for Avian Influenza within 10 days prior to entry.

PIGEONS

There are no requirements governing the movements of pigeons within or into Illinois.

RABBITS

There are no requirements governing the movements of rabbits within or into Illinois.

LLAMAS

There are no requirements governing the movement of llamas within Illinois. A permit and health certificate is required for out-of-state llamas. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS REQUIRED ON ALL ENTRIES

- 1. Entry Fee \$6.00 per entry. Stall Rent \$5.00 per stall. (Each exhibitor must pay entry and stall fees regardless of 4-H participation.)
- 2. Registration papers will be checked. Every animal (over 6 months of age) shown as breeding beef must be registered with a breed association. This includes animals shown in Section 6, Other Breeds.
- 3. All animals must be in place on the grounds by 8:00 A.M. August 16th, 2023
- 4. Cattle will be released at 5:00 P.M. August 20, 2023. Premium Checks will be passed out at 4:00 P.M. of that same day. First place monies will be paid in all classes that have entries.
- 5. Any bull over 12 months old must have nose lead.
- 6. No fitting chutes in the barn at any time.
- 7. All market animals must weigh in Tuesday evening between 7:30 P.M. and 9:00 P.M. NO REWEIGHS!
- 8. All cattle must be washed only in designated wash rack areas.
- 9. No generators or fans in alley or doorways.
- 10. No artificial hair or artificial color added to hair.

The WCFA reserves the right to order blood tests by a veterinarian of any and all animals brought onto the Winnebago County Fairgrounds. The veterinarian shall be chosen by the WCFA. Market lambs whose physical structure has been altered in any way (removal of ribs, etc.) will not be allowed to show at this fair. This does not include various castration procedures. Exhibitors are required to arrange hauling for hogs going to a different processor or back to the farm. Hogs going to market or Eickman's will be loaded out Sunday afternoon. Remaining hogs will be released at 5:00 P.M.
- 8. By the end of the Open Show Friday, August 18, the superintendent must know each hog(s) destination. If no information is given, hog(s) will be sent to market.
- 9. A veterinarian will be at the fair to inspect livestock upon arrival.
- 10. When hog is weighed in and tagged, exhibitors are expected to report what classes it will be in.
- 11. Please note: All livestock exhibitors are expected to keep a clean, clear walkway and appearance in their respective areas, removing manure and other waste materials into designated are. Swine exhibitors must clean and remove manure to designated area before premium checks will be issued at 4:00 P.M. Sunday. Pens must be bedded with wood shavings.
- 12. All exhibitors must have a Premise I.D. registered with the state. Register online at www.agr.state.il.us. If no number is on record, hog(s) are not allowed to go to market.
- 13. No screws or staples are allowed in gates.
- 14. The Superintendents have the right to limit the number of pens purchased and may require animals to share a pen when necessary.
- 15. All animals must be on the grounds by 8:00 A.M., August 16, 2023.

- 2. Vegetables such as potatoes and onions are judged on ability to keep, therefore do not over peel onions. Remove onion roots. Dig and dry them several weeks before the show. Do not remove all the outer leaves on cabbage as well.
- 3. Remove tops from carrots, beets, and onions allow 2" of stem. Follow suggestions in Hort Fact Sheet #VG-24-SL from the University of Illinois County Extension Office.
- 4. Vegetables are judged on basis of quality, not largest (unless so stated), condition of fresh and fit to each, free from disease and insects, and uniform samples.
- 5. Do not husk sweet corn.

- 7. Exhibits must be labeled with the name of the food, the date preserved, and the method of food preservation. Entries without required labeling will not be judged.
- 8. Canned goods will not be judged by tasting; visual inspection will be used for the most part. Jars may need to be opened, however, when spoilage is suspected or differences among entries are very small.
- 9. The decisions of the judges are final.
- 10. Foods that are opened during judging will be marked by the judges and should not be eaten when the fair or event is over. Any foods that are considered hazardous to consume will be disposed of by the judges or fair attendants. (This includes the jar or packaging that contains the food).
- 11. All produce items should be preserved in glass jars and processed by canning or hot water bath. No frozen products will be accepted.

EXHIBITORS MAY ENTER A MAXIMUM OF 2 ENTRIES PER CLASS BUT MAY NOT ENTER MORE THAN 13 TOTAL ENTRIES.

- 1. Entry fee of \$2.50 per print entered in competition. All entry forms must be received by 4:00 pm, Saturday, August 5, 2023. Fees must be paid by August 5, 2023. **DO NOT BRING EXHIBITS at time of REGISTRATION**.
- 2. No photograph winning a ribbon in previous Winnebago County Fair photo contests may be entered again. This includes images, which have been changed very slightly by cropping, coloring or are similar in concept.
- 3. Exhibits may be brought to Building 5 (Aqua) between 10:00A.M.and 6:00 P.M. Monday, August 14, 2023
- 4. **Size change**: 5" X 7" Prints must be in an 8' X 10' frame. Panoramic prints must be a minimum of 3.5' X 10'.
- 5. Presentation: Prints must be displayed in a **frame under glass** or as a **canvas wrap**.
- 6. Framing: The frame on any print cannot be wider than 2 inches in diameter on any side. The largest frame print cannot exceed a standard 16" by 20" frame. Print sizes 8" by 10", 8" by 12", 11" by 14", and 16" by 20". The 'No Frame' Frame cannot be accepted because of safety reasons.
- 7. Attachment: All framed pictures must be attached securely and permanently with wire and 2 round screws into the frame with wire to hang straight.
- 8. Write or place a label with your name, address, and telephone number on the back of the picture frame. Exhibitor tags will be taped to the bottom right hand corner of the frame.
- 9. This contest is open to amateur photographers only. A professional is defined as a person who maintains a commercial/public studio.
- 10. Any image entered into the photography contest cannot be entered or exhibited in any other category or department at the Winnebago County Fair. This includes similar images as described under #2 above.
- 11. The Superintendent has the right to disqualify any entry deemed inappropriate or in bad taste. The superintendent may place a photo in another class more appropriate without consent of the exhibitor. Definition of Classes

Landscapes: A broad view of scenery (trees, desert, mountains, prairies, fields, etc..).

Sky/Waterscapes: A broad view of scenery where the primary focus is on the activity in the sky or the relationship or activity on the water (lake, waterfalls, clouds, etc...).

Animals: A photograph of any living animal or bird domestic or otherwise, which may be found in a zoo, jungle, forest, or your backyard. No humans may be in the photo. The emphasis is on the animal.

People - Portraits: A posed picture of one or more people. An arranged picture set up by the photographer. The subject knows they are being photographed. The picture may include props such as ash trees, houses, hats, chairs, backdrops, flowers or environmental settings.

Travel or Photo Journalism: The photo depicts an individual, group, or ethnic culture engaged in an activity, which is outside normal daily experience to the traveler in the U.S. or a foreign country. The photo tells the story in the moment.

Down on the Farm/Life in the Country: A picture depicting rural scenery or everyday farm life or events: The picture may include people engaging in some aspect of farming.

Architecture: A city scape, a portion of a building, monument, or images/patterns or design that emphasizes line and form.

Close-Up: A photograph placing emphasis on a portion of a human subject (such as eyes or hands), or an emphasis of larger than life of an insect, part of a flower. Detail not easily visible to the eye.

Collage: A collage is an unlimited number of related photos which may vary in size, place inside a frame 11x14 to 16x20 that compose a pleasing composition. (No matting required). A picture may be superimposed or overlapping. The theme is open and may be a grouping of landscapes, still life, people, sporting events, etc...

Still Life: Photos of groups of things that are not moving, and arranged in a decorative way. These may be 'found' arrangements that create a pleasing line or view, or the photographer may intentionally arrange them.

Photoshop: The emphasis is on what the photographer does with a photo <u>after</u> it is taken using a computer imaging program to <u>distort</u> reality and create a new photo image.

Black and White and Blue: A print contrasting one color. Black, blue, and Sepia are acceptable. NO PORTRAITS.

Where's the Light: The emphasis is on the use or the impact of light in the photograph. This may be natural or created by artificial light. People may be in the picture, but it is not a portrait.

City Scape/Street Scape: The photo draws attention to the street either via shop window/vendor selling their goods, or an interesting still life design using items such as bushes, flowers, lights, etc... People may be part of the composition.
